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in this course which is the second part of a two year study of u s history that begins in grade 8 students will study the history of the united states since reconstruction to the present historical content will focus on the political economic and social events and issues related to industrialization and urbanization major wars domestic and foreign policies of the cold war and post cold war eras and reform movements including civil rights students will

examine the impact of geographic factors on major events and analyze causes and effects of the great depression students will examine the impact of the constitutional issues on american society evaluate the dynamic relationship of the three branches of the federal government and analyze efforts to expand the democratic process students will describe the relationship between the arts and the times during which they were created students will analyze the impact of technological innovations on the american labor movement students will use critical thinking skills to explain and apply different methods that historians use to interpret the past including points of view and historical context

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the past fifteen years have seen renewed interest in the civil rights movement television documentaries films and books have brought the struggles into our homes and classrooms once again new evidence in older criminal cases demands that the judicial system reconsider the accuracy of investigations and legal decisions racial profiling affirmative action voting districting and school voucher programs keep civil rights on the front burner in the political arena in light of this there are very few resources for teaching the civil rights at the university level this timely and invaluable book fills this gap this book offers perspectives on presenting the movement in different classroom contexts strategies to make the movement come alive for students and issues highlighting topics that students will find appealing including sample syllabi and detailed descriptions from courses that prove effective this work will be useful for all instructors both college and upper level
