

An Introduction To English Sentence Structure

first published in 1987 most introductory textbooks in phonetics are designed to turn the people who use them into phoneticians people who take phonetics courses on the other hand do not in general wish to become specialists but rather need to know what the study of phonetics has to offer in some other field this book is intended for those involved in any way with the study of the english language for students of linguistics or literature teachers of english and those involved with the study of literacy or the analysis of discourse or conversation

this core textbook helps readers get to grips with the fundamentals of english grammar so that they can critically engage with a wide variety of texts combining contemporary linguistic approaches with the familiar terminology of traditional grammar this lively book offers a hands on introduction to english grammar it begins by situating the study of grammar within its broader context before moving on to look at the various categories that are used when analysing texts later chapters focus on the practical application of the skills acquired in the first part of the book this is an indispensable text for students and teachers of english language and linguistics it is also a valuable resource for those studying english as a second or foreign language new to this edition a wealth of new material including further detail on morphology more examples and revised explanations of key terms improved glossary and index in response to detailed user feedback fully updated throughout to meet the needs of today's students

an introduction to early modern english this book helps students of english and linguistics to place the language of the period 1500 1700 in its historical context as a language with a common core but

also as one which varies across time regionally and socially and according to register the volume focuses on the structure of what contemporaries called the general dialect its spelling vocabulary grammar and pronunciation and on its dialectal origins the book also discusses the language situation and linguistic anxieties in England at a time when Latin exerted a strong influence on the rising standard language the volume includes the major changes in English from the 15th to the 18th century emphasis on long term linguistic developments sources for the study of early modern English illustrations ranging from drama and personal letters to trials and early science exercises encouraging further exploration of the changing English language

The history of English an introduction provides a chronological analysis of the linguistic social and cultural development of the English language from before its establishment in Britain around the year 450 to the present each chapter represents a new stage in the evolution of the language all illustrated with a rich and diverse selection of primary texts the book also explores the wider global course of the language including a historical review of English in its pidgin and creole varieties and as a native and or second language in the Caribbean Africa Asia and Australasia the third edition carefully revised and updated throughout includes chapter introductions and conclusions to assist in orientation plus additional marginal references throughout the addition of 21 timelines often running from Old English to present day English and focusing on a variety of features a new focus on the relevance of change for and in present day English discussions on the role and image of women the invisibility of social classes and regional variation in English material on bilingualism code switching and borrowing and on the effects of the social media on language use over 90 textual examples demonstrating linguistic change and over 100 figures tables and maps including 31 colour images to support and illuminate the text updated online support material including brief introductions to Old and to Middle English further articles on linguistic historical and cultural phenomena which go beyond the scope of the book additional sample texts exercises and audio clips with study questions as well as recommendations for further reading and topics for further study the history of English is essential reading for any student of the English language and will be of relevance to any course addressing the origins and development of the English language

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
