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in the 1940s film now voyager bette davis plays a daughter struggling against her mother s stifling repression nearly fifty years later in the hollywood saga postcards from the edge shirley maclaine as a neglectful and bossy mother inflicts untold psychological pain on her daughter played by meryl streep these dramas of conflict and the ambivalent struggle for separation have been central

to popular images of mothers and daughters in the last half century in the u s walters boldly challenges these dichotomies and proposes an innovative and multilayered understanding of the cultural construction of the mother daughter relationship in a discussion of popular media ranging from themes of maternal martyrdom to maternal malevolence walters shows that since world war ii mainstream culture has generally represented the mother daughter relationship as one of never ending conflict and thus promoted an ideology of separation as necessary to the daughter s emancipation and maturity this ideological move is placed in a social context of the anti woman backlash of the early post war period and the renewed anti feminism of the reagan and bush years walters uses exceptions to mainstream imagery films such as *a tree grows in brooklyn* television shows like *maude* novels like *the joy luck club* to offer evidence of alternative traditions and paradigms timely and vividly argued *lives together worlds apart* makes a brilliant contribution to discussions of popular culture and feminism in the 1940s film *now voyager* bette davis plays a daughter struggling against her mother s stifling repression nearly fifty years later in the hollywood saga *postcards from the edge* shirley maclaine as a neglectful and bossy mother in

comprehensive in its coverage the womanist reader is the first volume to anthologize the major works of womanist scholarship charting the course of womanist theory from its genesis as alice walker s african american feminism through chikwenye okonjo ogunyemi s african womanism and clenora hudson weems africana womanism to its present day expression as a global anti oppressionist perspective rooted in the praxis of everyday women of color this interdisciplinary reader traces the rich and diverse history of a quarter century of womanist thought featuring selections from over a dozen disciplines by top womanist scholars from around the world plus several critiques of womanism an extensive bibliography of womanist sources and the first ever systematic treatment of womanist thought on its own terms layli phillips has assembled a unique and groundbreaking compilation

inside and outside marriage what happens to the woman betrayed how do abandoned wives or lovers feel what happens when the battle between the sexes becomes a triangle the plots in this collection of eighteen stories written between the 1840s and 1980s are infinitely variable and the outcomes will enrage shock amuse and sometimes hearten in some stories women forge links with other women in solidarity in others women fight for their men and win in many stories the betrayal ultimately enriches the central

character who learns through the loss of her man the value of her own life

an introduction to womanist biblical interpretation provides a much needed introduction to womanist approaches to biblical interpretation it argues that womanist biblical interpretation is not simply a byproduct of feminist biblical interpretation but part of a distinctive tradition of african american women s engagement with biblical texts while womanist biblical interpretation is relatively new in the development of academic biblical studies african american women are not newcomers to biblical interpretation written in an accessible style this volume highlights the importance of both the bible and race in the development of feminism and the emergence of womanism it provides a history of feminist biblical interpretation and discusses the current state of womanist biblical interpretation as well as critical issues related to its development and future although some african american women identify themselves as womanists the term its usage its features and its connection to feminism remain widely misunderstood this excellent textbook is perfect for helping to introduce readers to the development and applications of womanist biblical interpretation

brenda cooper examines the work of the new generation of african writers who have placed migration as central to their writing there is a new interest among publishers in new york and london in books by writers of african origin these authors have often grown up or passed their early adult years out of africa the orange prize for fiction was awarded in london 2007 to chimamanda ngozie adichie's *half of a yellow sun* and the caine prize for african writing has introduced new writers such as leila aboulela biyi bandele and chimamanda adichie herself to agents and publishers this examination of the extraordinary work which has recently appeared is therefore very timely migration is a central theme of much african fiction written in english here brenda cooper tracks the journeys undertaken by a new generation of african writers their protagonists and the solid objects that populate their fiction to depict the material realities of their multiple worlds and languages the book explores the uses to which the english language is put in order to understand these worlds it demonstrates how these writers have contested the dominance of colonising metaphors the writers challenge is to find an english that can effectively express their many lives languages and identities brenda cooper is director of the centre for african studies and a professor in the department of english language and literature at the university of cape town southern africa south africa botswana namibia lesotho and swaziland university of kwazulu natal press pb

this work discusses the validity of the perception that the new generation of african novelists is different in vision style and worldview from the older generation the 13 papers have been carefully selected to highlight the contention that the previous generation made culture conflict their sole theme

thirty four critical essays on the lives and literary achievements of black american writers from as early as the first slave narratives down to the latest works of such contemporary figures as ishmael reed and jean toomer each essay strikes a balance between biography and literary criticism giving full consideration to the effects of culture and life experience on the core writings of the
