ecocriticism explores the ways in which we imagine and portray the relationship between humans and

the environment across many areas of cultural production including romantic poetry wildlife documentaries climate models the hollywood blockbuster the day after tomorrow and novels by margaret atwood kim scott barbara kingsolver and octavia butler greg garrard's animated and accessible volume responds to the diversity of the field today and explores its key concepts including pollution pastoral wilderness apocalypse animals indigeneity the earth thoroughly revised to reflect the breadth and diversity of twenty first century environmental writing and criticism this edition addresses climate change and justice throughout and features a new chapter on indigeneity it also presents a glossary of terms and suggestions for further reading concise clear and authoritative ecocriticism offers the ideal introduction to this crucial subject for students of literary and cultural studies

the oxford handbook of ecocriticism provides a broad survey of the longstanding relationship between literature and the environment the moment for such an offering is opportune in many respects multiple environmental crises are increasingly inescapable at both transnational and local levels the role of the humanities in addition to technology and politics is increasingly recognized as central for exploring and finding solutions and the subject of ecocriticism has reached a kind of critical mass both within its anglo american heartlands and beyond from its origins in the study of american nature writing and british romanticism ecocriticism has developed along numerous theoretical historical cultural and geographical axes the most contemporary and exciting of which will be represented in the handbook the contributors include eminent founders of the field including michael branch and richard kerridge a number of key second wave ecocritics and the best up and coming scholars topics covered include renaissance anxieties about nature the challenges of representing climate change the racialization of the environment in the early 20th century language and the concept of biosemiotics and the possibilities for environmental humour

this element presents a necessary intervention within the rapidly expanding field of research in the

environmental humanities on climate change and environmental literacy in contrast to the dominant science centred literacy debates which largely ignore the unique resources of the humanities it asks how does literary reading contribute to climate change communication how does this contribution relate to recent demands for environmental and related literacies rather than reducing the function of literature to a more pleasurable form of information transfer or its affective dimension of evoking sympathy climate change literacy thoroughly reassesses the cognitive affective and pedagogic potentials of literary writing it does so by analysing a selection of popular climate novels and by demonstrating the role of fiction in fostering a more adequate understanding of and response to climate change this title is also available as open access on cambridge core

the concept of framing has long intrigued and troubled scholars in fields including philosophy rhetoric media studies and literary criticism but framing also has rich implications for environmental debate urging us to reconsider how we understand the relationship between humans and their ecological environment culture and nature the contributors to this wide ranging volume use the concept of framing to engage with key questions in environmental literature history politics film tv and pedagogy in so doing they show that framing can serve as a valuable analytical tool connecting different academic discourses within the emergent interdisciplinary field of the environmental humanities no less importantly they demonstrate how increased awareness of framing strategies and framing effects can help us move society in a more sustainable direction

defined as an ecological epoch in which humans have the most impact on the environment the anthropocene poses challenging questions to literary and cultural studies if in the anthropocene the distinction between nature and culture increasingly collapses we have to rethink our division between historiography and natural history as well as notions of the subject and of agency since the enlightenment this anthology collects papers from literary and cultural studies that address various issues surrounding the topic even though the new epoch seems to require a collective self understanding as a unified species readings of the anthropocene and conceptualizations of human nature relationships largely differ in anglophone literatures and cultures these differing perspectives are reflected in the structure of this book which is divided into five separate sections the introductory part familiarizes the reader with the concept and the challenges it poses for the humanities in general and for literary and cultural studies in particular and the three following sections combine broader more theoretical essays with in depth critical readings of us canadian and australian representations of the anthropocene in literature the final part moves beyond literature to include media theoretical perspectives and discussions of photography and cinema in the anthropocene

special focus omission edited by patrick gill throughout literary history and in many cultures we encounter an astute use of conspicuous absences to conjure an imagined reality into a recipient's mind the term omission as used in the present study then demarcates a common artistic phenomenon a silence blank or absence introduced against the recipient's generic or experiential expectations but which nonetheless frequently encapsulates the tenor of the work as a whole such omissions can be employed for their affective potential when emotions represented or evoked by the text are deemed to be beyond words they can be employed to raise epistemological questions as when an omission marks the limits of what can be known ethical questions can also be approached by means of omissions as when a character's voice is omitted for instance finally omission always carries within it the potential to reflect on the media and genres on which it is brought to bear as its efficacy depends on the recipient's generic expectations omission is frequently characterized by a high degree of meta-discursiveness this volume investigates the various strategies with which the phenomenon of omission is employed across a range of textual forms and in different cultures to conclusively argue for its status as a highly effective and near universal form of artistic signification
