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moral psychology is the systematic inquiry into how morality works when it does work and breaks down when it doesn t work in this comprehensive new textbook mark alfano outlines the five central concepts in the study of moral psychology agency patiency sociality temporality and reflexivity subsequent chapters each assess a key area of research which alfano relates both to the five central concepts and to empirical findings he then draws out the philosophical implications of those findings before suggesting future directions for research one of alfano s guiding themes is that moral philosophy without psychological content is empty whereas psychological investigation without philosophical insight is blind he advocates and demonstrates a holistic vision that pictures moral psychology as a project of collaborative inquiry into the

descriptive and normative aspects of the human condition featuring a glossary of technical terms further reading sections and chapter by chapter study questions this rich systematic and accessible introduction to moral psychology will be suitable for both undergraduates and researchers in philosophy psychology and related fields

this book a review of the psychological literatures with allied traditions in ethics emphasizes parenting and educational strategies for influencing moral behavior reasoning and character development and charts a line of research for the post kohlbergian era in moral psychology

released in 2014 this was the first philosophy textbook in moral psychology introducing students to a range of philosophical topics and debates such as what is moral motivation do reasons for action always depend on desires is emotion or reason at the heart of moral judgment under what conditions are people morally responsible are there self interested reasons for people to be moral the second edition of moral psychology a contemporary introduction updates its responses to these questions taking advantage of the explosion of recent research from philosophers and psychologists on these topics and adding a chapter on the question of whether morality is innate or learned as before the book emphasizes the relationship between traditional and interdisciplinary

approaches to moral psychology and aims to carefully explain how empirical research is or is not relevant to philosophical inquiry the bulleted summaries study questions and lists for further readings at the end of each chapter have been updated key updates to the second edition includes a new opening section on human nature borrowing material from elsewhere in the book adds a new chapter on evolutionary and developmental arguments for the innateness of morality expands coverage of the challenges to psychological research including the replication crisis and the weirdness challenge provides a new section on implicit bias and moral responsibility offers enhanced clarity and accessibility throughout includes up to date further reading sections and bibliography

in most western societies guilt is widely regarded as a vital moral emotion in addition to playing a central role in moral development and progress many take the capacity to feel guilt as a defining feature of morality itself no truly moral person escapes the pang of guilt when she has done something wrong but proponents of guilt s importance face important challenges such as distinguishing healthy from pathological forms of guilt and accounting for the fact that not all cultures value guilt in the same way if at all in this volume philosophers and psychologists come together to think more systematically about the nature and value of guilt the book begins with chapters on the biological origins and psychological nature of guilt and moves on to discuss the

culturally enriched conceptions of guilt and its value that we find in various eastern and western philosophic traditions in addition numerous chapters discuss healthy or morally valuable forms guilt and their pathological or irrational shadows

philosophers and psychologists have been hard at work trying to unlock the mysteries of our characters unfortunately their answers have been all over the map according to one position every single person has all of the moral virtues such as modesty and compassion although to varying degrees yet according to another position no one has any character traits at all since they are simply illusions and do not exist hence not one person is honest or compassionate or courageous and between these extremes there are plenty of intermediate views christian b miller argues that not one of these leading positions accurately reflects what most of us are like today he explores the implications of the mixed trait framework a theory of moral character developed in his previous book moral character an empirical theory mixed traits have both morally positive aspects hence they are not vices along with morally negative aspects hence they are not virtues miller engages with the other leading positions on the empirical nature of character situationism the caps model the big five model and the local trait model he goes on to apply the mixed trait framework to several important topics in ethics especially the development of an error theory about judgments of character and the challenge faced by virtue ethics from the widespread lack of virtue

brian leiter defends a set of radical ideas from nietzsche there is no objectively true morality there is no free will no one is ever morally responsible and our conscious thoughts and reasoning play almost no significant role in our actions and how our lives unfold leiter presents a new interpretation of main themes of nietzsche s moral psychology including his anti realism about value including epistemic value his account of moral judgment and its relationship to the emotions his conception of the will and agency his scepticism about free will and moral responsibility his epiphenomenalism about certain kinds of conscious mental states and his views about the heritability of psychological traits in combining exegesis with argument leiter engages the views of philosophers like harry frankfurt t m scanlon and gary watson and psychologists including daniel wegner benjamin libet and stanley milgram nietzsche emerges not simply as a museum piece from the history of ideas but as a philosopher and psychologist who exceeds david hume for insight into human nature and the human mind repeatedly anticipates later developments in empirical psychology and continues to offer sophisticated and unsettling challenges to much conventional wisdom in both philosophy and psychology

an argument that moral psychology can benefit from closer integration with the social sciences offering a novel ethical theory bridging the two in this book mark fedyk offers a novel analysis of the relationship between moral psychology and allied fields in the social sciences fedyk shows how the social sciences can be integrated with moral philosophy argues for the benefits of such an integration and offers a new ethical theory that can be used to bridge research between the two fedyk argues that moral psychology should take a social turn investigating the psychological processes that motivate patterns of social behavior defined as ethical using normative information extracted from the social sciences he points out methodological problems in conventional moral psychology particularly the increasing methodological and conceptual inconsilience with both philosophical ethics and evolutionary biology fedyk s causal theory of ethics is designed to provide moral psychology with an ethical theory that can be used without creating tension between its scientific practice and the conceptual vocabulary of philosophical ethics his account aims both to redirect moral psychology toward more socially realistic questions about human life and to introduce philosophers to a new form of ethical naturalism a way of thinking about how to use different fields of scientific research to answer some of the traditional questions that are at the heart of ethics

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many philosophers believe that normative ethics is in principle independent of psychology by contrast the authors of these essays explore the interconnections between psychology and moral theory they investigate the psychological constraints on realizable ethical ideals and articulate the psychological assumptions behind traditional ethics they also examine the ways in which the basic architecture of the mind core emotions patterns of individual development social psychology and the limits on human capacities for rational deliberation affect morality

this comprehensive and cutting edge volume maps out the terrain of moral psychology a dynamic and evolving area of research in 57 concise chapters leading authorities and up and coming scholars explore fundamental issues and current controversies the volume systematically reviews the empirical evidence base and presents influential theories of moral judgment and behavior it is organized around the key questions that must be addressed for a complete understanding of the moral mind

this element provides an overview of some of the central issues in contemporary moral psychology it explores what moral psychology is whether we are always motivated by self interest what good character looks like and whether anyone has it whether moral judgments always motivate us to act whether what motivates action is always a desire of some kind and what the role is of reasoning and deliberation in moral judgment and action this element is aimed at a general audience including undergraduate students without an extensive background in philosophy

compassion is widely regarded as an important moral emotion a fitting response to various cases

of suffering and misfortune yet contemporary theorists have rarely given it sustained attention this volume aims to fill this gap by offering answers to a number of questions surrounding this emotion these questions include what is the nature of compassion how does compassion differ from other emotions such as empathy pity or gratitude is compassion a virtue can we have too much compassion how does compassion influence other mental states desires motivations beliefs and intentions and behaviour how is compassion influenced by the environment must compassion be deserved can one be moral while lacking the capacity for compassion compassion like other emotions has many facets biological social psychological and neural among others the contributors to this volume will draw on a variety of disciplines and methods in order to develop a more systematic and comprehensive understanding of this often neglected moral emotion

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
