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philosophical reflection on death dates back to ancient times but death remains a most profound and puzzling topic samantha brennan and robert stainton have assembled a compelling selection of core readings from the philosophical literature on death the views of ancient writers such as plato epicurus and lucretius are set alongside the work of contemporary figures such as thomas nagel john perry and judith jarvis thomson brennan and stainton divide the anthology into three parts part i considers questions about the nature of death and our knowledge of it what does it mean to be dead is it possible to survive death is the end of life a mystery part ii asks how we should view death what if anything is so bad about dying if death is nothingness should it be feared or regretted part iii examines ethical questions related to killing particularly abortion euthanasia and suicide is killing ever permissible under what conditions or circumstances

la peste in english the plague originally published in 1947 by the nobel prize winning writer albert camus chronicles the progression of deadly bubonic plague as it spreads through the quarantined algerian city of oran while most discussions of fictional examples within aesthetics are either historical or hypothetical camus offers an example of pestilence fiction camus chose fiction to convey facts about plagues in the past his own bout with tuberculosis at age seventeen living under quarantine away from home for several years and forced separation from his wife who remained in algiers while he was abroad in nazi occupied france his own lived experiences undergird an imaginative account of shared human realities with which we can identify vulnerability to the disease isolation fear and finally humanitarianism the plague teaches us to neither covet nor expect what we so casually took for granted this collection of original essays on philosophical themes in the plague is of special relevance during and in the aftermath of covid 19 but also provides reflections that will be of lasting value to those interested in this classic work of literature the novel explores questions of enduring importance do we collectively meet the threshold of ethical behaviour posed by camus who wrote what s true of all the evils in the world is true of plague as well it helps men to rise above themselves or does the absurd undermine the compassionate do heroes dutifully fight a plague with common decency or does human nature resign itself to the normalization of uncontrollable suffering and death there are myriad ways to approach the novel and this volume encourages readers to ponder human dilemmas in fictional oran informed by our current pandemic

in reading death in ancient rome mario erasmo considers both actual funerary rituals and their literary depictions in epic elegy epitaphs drama and prose works as a form of participatory theater in which the performers and the depictees of rituals engage in strategies to involve the viewer reader in the ritual process specifically by invoking and playing on their cultural associations at a number of levels simultaneously he focuses on the associative reading process the extent to which literary texts allude to funeral and burial ritual the narrative role played by the allusion to recreate a fictive version of the ritual and how the allusion engages readers

knowledge of the ritual or previous literary intertexts such a strategy can advance a range of authorial agendas by inviting readers to read and reread assumptions about both the surrounding roman culture and earlier literature invoked through intertextual referencing by re defining their relation to the dead readers assume various roles in an ongoing communion with the departed reading death in ancient rome makes an important and innovative contribution to semiotic theory as applied to classical texts and to the emerging field of mortality studies it should thus appeal to classicists as well as to advanced undergraduate and graduate students in art history and archeology

seminar paper from the year 2017 in the subject english language and literature studies literature lmu munich language english abstract reading essays on james joyce s short story the dead one is immediately confronted with the most different interpretations of its end as it is very different from the rest of the text and can even be seen as poetic apparently gabriel s epiphany is of prime importance to the readers of james joyce this term paper shall answer the question why this is the case therefore it is necessary to comprehend the extreme development of gabriel within the story this work claims that gabriel rather self centred at the beginning develops into an understanding artist towards the end of the story when he is somehow challenged by the dead after his wife s revelation as the title of the short story already reveals death plays a huge role in the text especially when causing gabriel s final enlightenment to prove this thesis first of all allusions to death in the text shall be found and interpreted as they function as framework for the gloomy core revealed at the end and thereby pave the way to gabriel s aesthetic development then the main character shall be examined on his artistic premises before the turning point signifies a change in his aesthetic views in the last chapter gabriel s transformation into an artist shall be elucidated more precisely with an emphasis put on his changing reception of the omnipresent snow transferring into a poetical symbol of death the snow motive connects art and death and therefore anticipates the aesthetic transformation in the views of the main character towards the much discussed end of the short story
