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the composition which the editors entitle the book of thoth is preserved on over forty graeco roman period papyri from collections in berlin copenhagen florence new haven paris and vienna the central witness is a papyrus of fifteen columns in the berlin museum written almost entirely in the demotic script the book of thoth is probably the product of scribes of the house of life the temple scriptorium it comprises largely a dialogue between a deity usually called he who praises knowledge presumably thoth himself and a mortal he who loves knowledge the work covers such topics as the scribal craft sacred

geography the underworld wisdom prophecy animal knowledge and temple ritual particularly remarkable is one section the vulture text in which each of the 42 nomes of egypt is identified with a vulture the language is poetic the lines are often clearly organized into verses the subject matter dialogue structure and striking phraseology raise many issues of scholarly interest especially intriguing are the possible connections between this egyptian work in which thoth is called thrice great and the classical hermetic corpus in which hermes trismegistos plays the key role the first volume comprises interpretative essays discussion of specific points such as the manuscript tradition script and language the core of the publication is the transliteration of the demotic text translation and commentary a consecutive translation glossary bibliography and indices conclude the first volume the second volume contains photographs of the papyri almost all of which reproduce their original size

alexandria to the great pyramid at giza the ancient egyptians produced several wonders of the world revolutionized architecture and construction created some of the world s first systems of mathematics and medicine and established language and art that spread across the known world with world famous leaders like king tut and cleopatra it s no wonder that today s world has so many egyptologists perhaps the most intriguing aspect of ancient egyptian civilization was its inception from the ground up as the ancient egyptians had no prior civilization which they could use as a template in fact ancient egypt itself became a template for the civilizations that followed the greeks and the romans were so impressed with egyptian culture that they often attributed many attributes of their own culture usually erroneously to the egyptians to the ancient egyptians as was the case with any society made up of inquiring humans the world was a confusing and often terrifying place of destruction death and unexplained phenomena in order to make sense of such an existence they resorted to teleological stories giving a phenomenon a story made it less horrifying and it also helped them make sense of the world around them unsurprisingly then the ancient egyptian gods permeated every aspect of existence baboons held a prestigious place in egyptian religion they were kept as sacred animals in many temples because contemporary egyptians considered them the original religious observers particularly with respect to the sun god re ancient egyptians took the wild baboons stretching on their hind legs forelegs raised to the sky to be an oration to the sun god at dawn furthermore these ancient ancestors of the land of egypt were greeted at dawn by the concatenations of the baboons nattering which the religious minded took to be an early morning devotion and even believed that the baboons spoke the original language of religion and a claim they could understand baboons was often one asserted by certain members of the priestly class however it is his association with the ibis that most defines thoth s visual imagery since the ancient egyptians believed that the universe arose from the swamp like waters of nun it was the water bird that garnered the most prestigious veneration birds like geese herons and the ibises were associated with this period of creation and according to some beliefs the world came about thanks to the great honk of a primordial goose whose eggshell was said to be preserved in the temple of thoth it was believed that re created thoth s baboon form to be that of his shining moon but his ibis form was that of a messenger between heaven and earth although he was much more than this thoth the history and legacy of the ancient egyptian god who maintains the universe looks at the mythology surrounding one of antiquity s most famous deities along with pictures depicting important people places and events you will learn about thoth like never before

if we were called upon to characterize the egyptian religion in a few words we should call it both as a system and as a cult an almost monarchical polytheism in a theocratic form the egyptian polytheism was not purely monarchical for there were several divine monarchies and only by the somewhat arbitrary doctrine that all the chief gods were in reality the same under different names could the semblance of monarchy be maintained but this religion was undoubtedly theocratic in the strictest sense of the word the divinity himself reigned through his son the absolute king his incarnation and representative on earth the priesthood of amon strengthened by its victory over the heretic and by the measureless wealth which the munificence of successful conquerors poured into its lap had attained the most tremendous power in the state and when after a long time its members had reduced the king to weak tools in their hands and succeeded at last in usurping the throne itself the theocracy was altered in form only but not in its essence the place of the king highpriest was taken by the highpriest king but even this change was of short duration against another power no less favored by the kings of the new empire the power of the army composed for the greater part of hired foreign troops the priestly princes proved unable to keep their ground they had to leave the country and in ethiopia they founded a new sacerdotal kingdom still the rule of the kings who sprang from this military revolution was purely theocratic but this only characterizes the form of the egyptian religion if we search for the leading thought contained in all its myths and symbols and in all its institutions and ceremonies it may best be comprised in the word life the sign of life ankh is the holiest and the most commonly used of all the symbols the gods bear it in their hands hold it to the lips of their worshippers and pour it out in streams over the heads of their favorites for they actually give life now by the light which they continually cause to triumph over the powers of darkness again by the regular recurrence of the fructifying waters or by mysterious

operations in the centre of the earth and hence they set such store on the possession of the lawful king he the son of the sun was the living pledge that these blessings should not cease his coronation was an agricultural festival the beginning of the harvest his greatest care was to spread the waters of the Nile through canals as far as possible over the fields from this arose also their great fear of death and eternal darkness and the efforts and sacrifices which they made to secure an eternal existence either in the fertile land of Osiris or as a follower of the god of light and as it is put to obtain the crown of life entirely swayed by these ideas the Egyptian although his religious thinking did not stand still clung to the existing state of things he did not relinquish what was old he may have connected different ideas with it but the holy texts which he muttered during the Ptolemaean era were often the same as those his ancestors had uttered at the altars and the tombs more than thirty centuries ago the nature of the land which bore and fed him had imprinted a peculiar stamp on his religion moreover his religion became to him more and more the only thing of supreme value treasures the fruits of his industry and all the skill which was the product of his remarkable civilization he spent on the building and the decorating of his tombs and temples those of Amon at Thebes gradually became the largest in the world his whole literature even that which was not destined for a religious purpose is with a few exceptions saturated by a religious spirit many of the virtues which we are apt to suppose a monopoly of Christian culture appear as the ideal of these old Egyptians Brugsch says a thousand voices from the tombs of Egypt declare this one inscription in Upper Egypt says he loved his father he honored his mother he loved his brethren and never went from his home in bad temper he never preferred the great man to the low one another says I was a wise man my soul loved God I was a brother to the great men and a father to the humble ones and never was a mischief maker an inscription at Sais on a priest who lived in the sad days of Cambyse says I honored my father I esteemed my mother I loved my brothers I found graves for the unburied dead I instructed little children I took care of orphans as though they were my own children for great misfortunes were on Egypt in my time and on this city of Sais in speaking of the ancient books of Egyptian wisdom the Ptah Hotep and the Ke Gemni Dr Battiscombe Gunn says nor do the oldest books of any other country approach these two in antiquity to draw comparisons between them let us in imagination place ourselves at the period at which Ptah Hotep lived that is about B.C. 3550 under King Isôsi and take a glance at futurity

english method retaining however as far as possible the expressions and metaphors of the egyptian in some cases i have inserted whole sentences in order to make the sense clear these are in places where the story divides naturally into several parts as in the battles of horus and the regions of night and thick darkness where each incident so like the one preceding and the one following is kept distinct in the mind of the reader by this means this repetition is quite in accordance with the style of egyptian literature the book is intended entirely for the general public who are increasingly interested in the religion and civilisation of ancient egypt but whose only means of obtaining knowledge of that country is apparently through magazine stories in which a mummy is the principal character it may be worth noting that in these legends of ancient egypt mummies are not mentioned except in the duat the home of the dead where one naturally expects to find them though the book is intended for the unscientific reader i have made some provision for the more serious student in the notes at the end in these i have given the origin of the legend the book or books in which that original is published and the book where the translation into a modern language by one of the great scholars of the day can be found other translations there are in plenty which can be seen in specialist libraries many of these however are of use only to a student of egyptian literature and language m a murray
