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applause books available for the first time in paperback from aristotle s poetics to vaclav havel the debate about the nature and function of theatre has been marked by controversy daniel gerould s landmark work theatre theory theatre collects history s most influential eastern and western dramatic theorists poets playwrights directors and philosophers whose ideas about theatre continue to shape its future in complete texts and choice excerpts spanning centuries we see an ongoing dialogue and exchange of ideas between actors and directors like craig and meyerhold and writers such as nietzsche and yeats each of gerould s introductory essays shows fascinating insight into both the life and the theory of the author from horace to soyinka corneille to brecht this is an indispensable compendium of the greatest dramatic theory ever written

beginning with aristotle and the greeks and ending with semiotics and post structuralism theories of the theatre is the first comprehensive survey of western dramatic theory in this expanded edition the author has updated the book and added a new concluding chapter that focuses on theoretical developments since 1980 emphasizing the impact of feminist theory

over the last few centuries the world as we know it has seen remarkable change and the arts including theatre have faced new challenges theatre is now no longer a simple point of entertainment laced with instruction or dissent but is perceived as a more collaborative idea that looks at ever changing paradigms all over the world theatre now is a dynamic process that simultaneously retains tradition and delves into extreme experimentations this book represents a starting point for a much needed critical interrogation it looks at the constant features of european theatre and brings in some indian elements positing both in their respective locations as well as looking at the symbiosis that has been functioning for some time

through a collection of original essays and case studies this innovative book explores theory as an accessible although complex tool for theatre practitioners and students these chapters invite readers to re imagine theory as a site of possibility or framework that can shape theatre making emerge from practice and foster new ways of seeing creating and reflecting focusing on the productive tensions and issues that surround creative practice and intellectual processes the contributing authors present central concepts and questions that frame the role of theory in the theatre ultimately this diverse and exciting collection offers inspiring ideas raises new questions and introduces ways to build theoretically minded dynamic production work

offers a theory and methodology of performance analysis as an alternative to traditional play analysis this book carries an underlying theme that theatre performance is a descriptive text generated by the theatre medium and that the process of generating meaning takes place in the actual encounter between a theatre performance and the spectator

the volume presents perspectives in the theory of drama and theatre that are new for the following reasons 1 the contributions reflect the international cooperation in developing drama and theatre as well as its theories 2 this collection is the first attempt of presenting papers within the context of analytical theory of science 3 it is the first consistent set of papers starting from semiotics as a meta theory the volume is divided into four sections i fundamental of theatre research ii theory of drama and theatre iii descriptive theatre research iv applied theatre research the fifth and final section offers a selective bibliography of analytical approaches to drama and theatre

people who don't know theatre may think the only creative artist in the field is the playwright with actors directors and designers mere interpreters of the dramatist's vision historically however creative mastery and power have passed through different hands sometimes the playwright did the staging in other periods leading actors demanded plays be changed to fatten their roles the late 19th and 20th centuries saw the rise of the director in which director and playwright struggled for creative dominance but no matter where the balance of power rested good theatre artists of all kinds have created powerful experiences for their audience the purpose of this volume is to bridge the interdisciplinary abyss between the study of creativity in theatre drama and in other fields sharing theories research findings and pedagogical practices the authors and i hope to stimulate discussion among creativity and theatre scholar teachers as well as multidisciplinary research theatre educators know from experience that performance classes enhance student creativity this volume is the first to bring together perspectives from multiple disciplines on how drama pedagogy facilitates learning creativity drawing on current findings in cognitive science as well as drama teachers lived experience the contributors analyze how acting techniques train the imagination allow students to explore alternate identities and discover the confidence to take risks the goal is to stimulate further multidisciplinary investigation of theatre education and creativity with the intention of benefitting both fields

featuring the writings of wilde brecht t s eliot and tennessee williams among many others this book considers theatrical aesthetics dramatic criticism and performance theory to help students teachers and practitioners to think critically about the nature of theatre

as early as plato theorists acknowledged the power of theatre as a way of teaching young minds similarly starting with plato philosophers occasionally adopted an anti theatrical stance worried by the dangers theatre posed to society the relationships between learning and theatre have never been seen as straightforward obvious or without contradictions this volume investigates the complexity of the intersection of theatre and learning addressing both the theoretical and practical aspects of it in three sections reflecting risking and re imagining theatre researchers education scholars theatre practitioners consider the tensions frictions and failures that make learning through theatre in theatre and about theatre interesting engaging and challenging loosely based on the

proceedings from the 20th festival of original theatre f o o t which took place in february 2012 at the university of toronto this book contains academic articles and interviews as well as position reflection and provocation papers from both established researchers in the field of applied theatre such as professor helen nicholson and professor kathleen gallagher as well as experienced and emergent scholars in education theatre dance and performance studies it also introduces the unorthodox work of the pre eminent swedish director and inventor of babydrama suzanne osten to the academic audience theatre and learning will be interesting to a wide range of audiences such as theatre artists and students theatre researchers and educators and will be particularly useful for those teaching theatre theory and practice including applied theatre in higher education

the urban theatre which emerged under anglo european and local influences in colonial metropolises such as calcutta and bombay around the mid nineteenth century marked the beginning of the modern period in indian theatre distinct from classical postclassical and more proximate precolonial traditions a poetics of modernity offers a unique selection of original theoretically significant writings on theatre by playwrights directors actors designers activists and policy makers to explore the full range of discursive positions that make these urban practitioners modern the source texts represent nine languages including english and about one third of them have been translated into english for the first time the volume thus retrieves a multilingual archive that so far had remained scattered in print and manuscript sources around the country a comprehensive introduction by dharwadker argues for historically precise definitions of theatrical modernity outlines some of its constitutive features and connects it to the foundational theoretical principles of urban theatre practice in modern india
