the collection of essays contained in this volume is written by a group of prominent scholars of arabic literature they explore various manifestations of traditional as well as modern and postmodern themes and techniques in arabic literature this is the first time the tripartite concepts of tradition modernity and postmodernity in arabic literary works are explored and analyzed in one volume it illustrates very clearly the fact that arabic literature has kept abreast not only of the primarily modern literary movements in the west that is amply illustrated by many studies to date but also of the postmodern condition scholars in the fields of arabic literature islamic studies comparative literature postmodern studies among others will find this collection of essays of great interest

what would world literature look like if we stopped referring to the west starting with the provocative premise that the west is ten percent of the planet world literature decentered is the first book to decenter eurocentric discourses of global literature and global history not just by deconstructing or historicizing them but by actively providing an alternative looking at a series of themes across three literatures mexico turkey and bengal the book examines hotels melancholy orientalism femicide and the ghost story in a series of literary traditions outside the west the non west the book argues is no fringe group or token minority in need of attention on the contrary it constitutes the overwhelming majority of this world

over the past two decades there has been a resurgence in the writing of african and african diaspora speculative and science fiction writing discussions around the rise of science fiction and fantasy have led to a push back by writers and scholars who have suggested that this is not a new phenomenon in african literature this collection focuses on the need to recalibrate ways of reading and categorising this genre of african writing through

critical examinations both of classics such as Kofi Awoonor's *Woman of the Aeroplanes* (1988) and Ngũgĩ wa Thiong'o's oeuvre as well as more recent fiction from writers including Nnedi Okorafor, Namwali Serpell and Masande Ntshanga back cover

Interviews with the Afro-German Africanist Theodor Wonja Michael and the Irish Nigerian dramatist Gabriel Gbadamosi are also included. Also offered are poems by Jack Mapanje and Kofi Anyidoho, short stories by Charles R. Larson and Robert Fraser, plays by Femi Osofisan and Martin Banham and an account of a dramatic reading of a script written and co-performed by James Gibbs.
