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*dawnland voices calls attention to the little known but extraordinarily rich literary traditions of new england's native americans this pathbreaking anthology includes both classic and contemporary literary works from ten new england indigenous nations the abenaki maliseet mi kmaq mohegan narragansett nipmuc passamaquoddy penobscot schaghticoke and wampanoag through literary collaboration and recovery siobhan senior and native tribal historians and scholars have crafted a unique volume covering a variety of genres and historical periods from the earliest petroglyphs and petitions to contemporary stories and hip hop poetry this volume highlights the diversity and strength of new england native literary traditions dawnland voices introduces readers to the compelling and unique literary heritage in new england banishing the misconception that real indians and their traditions vanished from that region centuries ago*

*about ten thousand years ago in the northeast the abenaki people of the dawn land created a thriving community in social and ecological balance with nature and with each other one of the finest sons of the people is young hunter who dedicates himself to becoming a pure hunter but a shadow is crossing over this place threatening his beloved homeland and young hunter is called to its defense the deep seeing one of his village bear talker tells him that the change will be brought by beings of great power with cold hearts and a terrible hunger and young hunter has been chosen to fight them this young one will do things for the people bear talker thought if he survives if he survives not knowing what the threat is young hunter embarks with his faithful dogs on a journey that will take him to new lands and test his resolve in unforeseen ways given a special weapon called the long thrower he must learn the secret of its power by studying with the deep seer medicine plant a woman apart she is a fine example of the importance of women in native society more than an action packed saga of a dangerous journey dawn land is a dramatic illumination of the highly developed value system of these pre contact native people its unforgettable story enriches the reader with a greater understanding of the lifeways of native peoples lifeways that survive to this day because they are built on maintaining balance and harmony with nature*

*taken to europe as a slave he found his way home and changed the course of american history american schoolchildren have long learned about squanto the welcoming native who made the first thanksgiving possible but his story goes deeper than the holiday legend born in the wampanoag speaking town of patuxet in the late 1500s squanto was kidnapped in 1614 by an english captain who took him to spain from there englishmen brought him to london and newfoundland before sending him home in 1619 when squanto discovered that most of patuxet had died in an epidemic a year later the mayflower colonists arrived at his home and renamed it plymouth prize winning historian andrew lipman explores the mysteries that still surround squanto how did he escape bondage and return home why did he help the english after an englishman enslaved him why did he threaten plymouth's fragile peace with its neighbors was it true that he converted to christianity on his deathbed drawing from a wide range of evidence and newly uncovered sources lipman reconstructs squanto's upbringing his transatlantic odyssey his career as an interpreter his surprising downfall and his enigmatic death the result is a fresh look at an epic life that ended right when many americans think their story begins*

*margaret m bruchac is a scholar writer and storyteller of abenaki english and slovak descent this is her first published book of verse some pieces were inspired by historical research for historic deerfield old sturbridge village the pocumtuck valley memorial association and other museums as a musician she also performs traditional and contemporary algonkian indian songs and stories with her family dr bruchac is assistant professor of anthropology and coordinator of native american and indigenous studies at the university of connecticut at every point her academic publications include indigenous archaeologies a reader in decolonization and articles in the historical journal of massachusetts and museum anthropology among other venues as the 2011 2012 recipient of both a ford foundation diversity fellowship and the katrin h lamon fellowship bruchac is presently in residence at the school for advanced research completing a book manuscript for the university of arizona press*

*can literary criticism help transform entrenched settler canadian understandings of history and place how are nationalist historiographies insular regionalisms established knowledge systems state borders and narrow definitions continuing to hinder the transfer of information across epistemological divides in the twenty first century what might nation to nation literary relations look like through readings of a wide range of northeastern texts including puritan captivity narratives wabanaki wampum belts and contemporary innu poetry rachel bryant explores how colonized and indigenous environments occupy the same given geographical coordinates even while existing in distinct epistemological worlds her analyses call for a vital and unprecedented process of listening to the stories that indigenous peoples have been telling about this continent for*

centuries at the same time she performs this process herself creating a model for listening and for incorporating those stories throughout this commitment to listening is analogous to homing the sophisticated skill that turtles insects lobsters birds and countless other beings use to return to sites of familiarity bryant adopts the homing process as a reading strategy that continuously seeks to transcend the distortions and distractions that were intentionally built into settler canadian culture across centuries

one of the great virtues of american medieval goes north is ist wide range of contributors with fascinatingly diverse relationships to the main terms of analysis there are academic scholars poets filmmakers tribal elders teachers at various levels there are indigenous people people from settler colonial cultures expats immigrants their analytic and imaginative encounters with the north catch at the intensely symbolic and political charge of that locus at a time when medieval studies cannot afford to ignore the period s popular uptake cannot continue with business as usual in the face of white supremacists brazen appropriations of the middle ages this volume points to new possibilities for grappling with the uneasy relationships between the american and the medieval prof carolyn dinshaw new york university

in company with its sister volume this book explores arts based approaches to research across media including film and comics related material from a variety of geographic locations and across a range of subdisciplines within the field of education this second volume has a focus exclusively on visual output and image based research and methods the book aims to highlight some of the approaches that are not always centered in arts based research the visual takes center stage as authors lead with comics based representations among other forms of arts based inquiry these chapters follow on from the first collection and serve to expand thinking about merging creative methods with analysis and exploration in the world of education from mixtapes to the curatorial these chapters showcase the ways in which scholars explore the multitude of human experiences this second volume covers among other topics comics in qualitative research visual journaling multimodal fieldnotes and discourse and creative visual outputs it is suitable reading for graduate students and scholars interested in qualitative inquiry and arts based methods in education and the social sciences

with the original publication of multicultural voices frances ann day celebrated the lives of thirty nine multicultural authors and illustrators helping educators bring students and authors together in a way that promoted stimulating reading imaginative writing and cultural sensitivity thousands of readers not only discovered a new body of literature they also gained new sensitivity to writing styles language subtleties and worldviews now the new edition has been significantly revised to keep it current and make it even more useful day has added a number of new authors updated the biographical profiles included reviews and activities for more than 120 new books and expanded the resource list for educators librarians and parents there are five appendixes containing assessment plans additional activities lists of birthdays a calendar of multicultural events and information on additional resources plus a comprehensive subject index helps readers plan story sessions and units of study themes curricular areas genres and topics facilitate the use of literature across the curriculum this guide is highly versatile enabling readers to adapt the material to fit their individual teaching and learning styles curriculum requirements and educational goals educators librarians and parents alike will find the book an inspiring resource

an introduction synthesizes the latest anthropological archaeological historical and sociological scholarship and the 95 carefully edited selections provide students with an overview of native american history from the earliest migrations to the present the volume includes a chronology glossary and bibliography making it a valuable teaching tool

now students can turn to a single comprehensive source for biography and criticism of native north american authors from both the written and oral traditions overview essays are followed by author entries that include biographical data critical material excerpted from books magazines and literary reviews a list of further sources and interviews when available other features include photographs a map showing tribal areas and major cultural groups and indexes to titles authors genres and major tribal affiliations

contains biographical information and critical essays concerning the works of over 100 authors and illustrators of children s works

this annotated bibliography of titles for children and young adults published from 1985 through the end of 1993 with 60 published since 1990 provides a one stop selection tool website
