## Early Medieval Architecture Oxford History

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medieval architecture comprises much more than the traditional image of gothic cathedrals and the castles of chivalry a great variety of buildings synagogues halls and barns testify to the diverse communities and interests in western europe in the centuries between 1150 and 1550 this book looks at their architecture from an entirely fresh perspective shifting the emphasis away from such areas as france towards the creativity of other regions including central europe and spain treating the subject thematically coldstream seeks out what all buildings both religious and secular have in common and how they reflect the material and spiritual concerns of the people who built and used them furthermore the author considers how and why after four centuries of shaping the landscapes and urban patterns of europe medieval styles were superseded by classicism

ranging from gotland to apulia roger stalley explores the richness and variety of european architecture in terms of the social and religious aspirations of the time with an emphasis on the symbolic significance these buildings expressed written with style and humour the lively text includes many quotations from ancient sources providing fascinating insight into the way that medieval buildings were created and enlivening our knowledge of this period

this volume offers unparalleled coverage of all aspects of art and architecture from medieval western europe from the 6th century to the early 16th century drawing upon the expansive scholarship in the celebrated grove dictionary of art and adding hundreds of new entries it offers students researchers and the general public a reliable up to date and convenient resource covering this field of major importance in the development of western history and international art and architecture

this dictionary provides a historical overview of the major architectural developments and styles building materials and types major structures and locations sites and architects historical eras like ancient egyptian architecture and the renaissance in europe and movements such as art deco are covered materials discussed range from concrete stone glass and wood while types of structures include architectural inventions such as the arch and dome to building types from monasteries and mosques to museums and skyscrapers major structures highlighted in this volume include not only great achievements such as hagia sophia and the eiffel tower but also important sites such as the great zimbabwe and angkor wat found on the unesco world heritage site list general geographical areas are also covered such as african and russian architecture noted architects include theorists from the ancient chinese engineer yu hao roman engineer vitruvius to many current architects such as zaha hadid and santiago calatrava with a focus on architects who have enjoyed lasting fame through history or have won international prizes such as the pritzker architecture prize this second edition of historical dictionary of architecture contains a chronology an introduction and an extensive bibliography the dictionary section has over 400 cross referenced entries on architects famous structures types of materials and the different architectural styles this book is an excellent access point for students researchers and anyone wanting to know more about architecture

aside from hagia sophia the monuments of the byzantine east are poorly understood today this is in sharp contrast to the well known architectural marvels of western europe a middle ages in this landmark survey distinguished art historian robert ousterhout introduces readers to the rich and diverse architectural traditions of the medieval eastern mediterranean the focus of the book is the byzantine or east roman empire 324 1453 ce with its capital in constantinople although the framework expands chronologically to include the foundations of christian architecture in late antiquity and the legacy of byzantine culture after the fall of constantinople in 1453 geographically broad as well this study includes architectural developments in areas of italy the caucasus the near east the balkans and russia as well as related developments in early islamic architecture alternating chapters that address chronological or regionally based developments with thematic studies that focus on the larger cultural concerns the book presents the architectural developments in a way that makes them accessible interesting and intellectually stimulating in doing so it also explains why medieval architecture in the east followed such a different trajectory from that of the west lavishly illustrated with hundreds of color photographs maps and line drawings eastern medieval architecture will establish byzantine traditions to be as significant and admirable as those more familiar examples in western europe and serve as an invaluable resource for anyone interested in architectural history byzantium and the middle ages

the renaissance was a diverse phenomenon marked by innovation and economic expansion the rise of powerful rulers religious reforms and social change encompassing the entire continent renaissance architecture examines the rich variety of buildings that emerged during these seminal centuries of european history although marked by the rise of powerful individuals both patrons and architects the renaissance was equally a time of growing group identities and communities and architecture provided the public face to these new identities religious reforms in northern europe spurred on by martin luther rejected traditional church function and decoration and proposed new models political ambitions required new buildings to satisfy court rituals territory nature and art intersected to shape new landscapes and building types classicism came to be the international language of an educated architect and an ambitious patron drawing on the legacy of ancient rome yet the richness of the medieval tradition continued to be used throughout europe often

alongside classical buildings examining each of these areas by turn this book offers a broad cultural history of the period as well as a completely new approach to the history of renaissance architecture the work of well known architects such as michelangelo and andrea palladio is examined alongside lesser known though no less innovative designers such as juan guas in portugal and benedikt ried in prague and eastern europe drawing on the latest research it also covers more recent areas of interest such as the story of women as patrons and the emotional effect of renaissance buildings as well as the impact of architectural publications and travel on the emerging new architectural culture across europe as such it provides a compelling introduction to the subject for all those interested in the history of architecture society and culture in the renaissance and european culture in general
