in expressionism and poster design in germany 1905 1925 kathleen chapman re defines expressionism by situating it in relation to the most common type of picture in public space during the wilhelmine twentieth century the commercial poster focusing equally on visual material and contemporaneous debates surrounding art posters and the image in general this study reveals that conceptions of a modern image were characterized not so much by style or mode of production and distribution but by a visual rhetoric designed to communicate more directly than words as instances of such rhetoric expressionist art and posters emerge as equally significant examples of this modern image demonstrating the interconnectedness of the aesthetic the utilitarian and the commercial in european modernism

in the wake of world war ii the paintings of jackson pollock mark rothko barnett newman willem de kooning and other new york school artists participated in a culture wide initiative to reimagine the self at a time when widely held beliefs about human nature and the human condition were coming to seem to many commentators increasingly outdated and inadequate abstract expressionism gave compelling visual form to a new subjectivity a new experience and idea of self in this original and wide ranging study michael leja argues that the interest of these artists in tapping primitive and unconscious components of self aligns them with many contemporary essayists hollywood filmmakers journalists and popular philosophers who were turning like the artists to psychology anthropology and philosophy in the effort to reformulate individual identity taking pollock s paintings and their reception as a case study leja shows that critics located in pollock s abstract forms a web of metaphors including spatial entrapment conflicted production energy flow gendered opposition and unconsciousness that situated the paintings in mainstream cultural discourses on the individual s sense of self and identity in this interpretative frame the cultural and ideological character of the art is illuminated according to leja abstract expressionism effectively enacted and represented the new conflicted layered subjectivity a feature that helps to account for the support and interest it garnered from cultural and political institutions alike

seminar paper from the year 2004 in the subject english language and literature studies culture and applied geography grade 1 7 free university of berlin john f kennedy institut language english abstract for a thorough understanding of the development of the american art scene in the 1950s and 1960s it is essential to have a close look on the early work of the forerunner robert rauschenberg whose art bridged the way between abstract expressionism and pop art in this context it is equally important to analyze susan sontag s essays on art and style from the mid 1960s which had a precursory function in the art critic world and promoted a new kind of sensibility to the audience to understand the development of rauschenberg s art concept which was breathtakingly new at its time it is inevitable to look at his artistic career and the different influences on his work from artistic models teachers and fellow artists additionally an analysis of the 1950s and 1960s art scene and the change of the audience s reception are equally necessary to recognize the significance of rauschenberg s work for its time and beyond sontag was one of the first critics to fully acknowledge the importance of rauschenberg s ideas for the development of the american art scene her essay collection is thus in itself a pioneer work of a new kind of art criticism rauschenberg s artwork as well

as Sontag's essays on the arts challenged people's perspective on art and its functions even though Sontag only directly refers twice to Rauschenberg's artwork in her essay collection *Against Interpretation*. Her ideas of the new kind of art of the late 1950s and early 1960s nevertheless strongly correspond to Rauschenberg's art concept. The artist and the art critic thus paved the way for a new understanding of art and its reception.

Weinstein explores the attitudes and organizations of artists and architects in Berlin, Munich, and Dresden in response to the tumultuous events associated with the end of WWI and the failed revolution. She traces the initial excitement and zeal and then the disillusionment as utopian dreams were dimmed by social, political, and military realities as well as by inherent contradiction within the arts movements themselves. Published in 1957, *German Expressionist Painting* was the first comprehensive study of one of the most pivotal movements in the art of this century when it was written. However, German Expressionism seemed like an eccentric manifestation far removed from what was then considered the mainstream of modern art. But as historians well know, each generation alters the concept of mainstream to encompass those aspects of the past which seem most relevant to the present. The impact of German Expressionism on the art and thought of later generations could never have been anticipated at the time of the original writing of this book. During the subsequent years, an enormous body of scholarly research and an even larger number of popular books on German Expressionist art has been printed. Numerous monographs and detailed studies on most of the artists exist now, and countless exhibitions with accompanying catalogues have taken place. Much of this new research could have been incorporated in a revised edition, and the bibliography certainly could have been greatly expanded to include the important writings which have been published in Germany, the United States, and elsewhere since this book was originally issued. The author, however, was faced with the choice of reprinting the original text with only the most necessary alterations, such as updating the captions to indicate present locations of the paintings or the preparation of a revised text and bibliography. Desirable as a revision appeared, present printing costs would have priced the paperback out of reach for students. It is for this reason that I decided to reissue the original text, which stands on its own as a primary investigation of German Expressionist painting.

This volume offers a brilliant re-reading of the representation of the human figure in the light of the Jewish experience, analyzing its appearance in the works of modernists such as Chagall, Freudlich, Lipchitz, Modigliani, Pissarro, Soutine, Zadkine, and contemporary artists such as Lucian, Freud, Alex Katz, and Kitaj. For more than 2000 years, Jewish art explored specific themes while blending with local cultures and aesthetics. At the turn of the 20th century, a significant number of Jewish artists were influenced by Western culture whilst remaining faithful to their heritages. This book is dedicated to the various aspects of their artistic endeavors, most notably the representation of the human face, a theme very close to their hearts. That they were influenced by their Jewish roots, their take on this widely explored subject proved highly unusual. They used it to express love and sorrow but also to fight nihilism, as the twentieth century saw the gradual vanishing of the human face in art and life.
