in repressed spaces paul carter tours the cultural history of agoraphobia the fear of open space its symptoms were first described in the anatomy of melancholy 1621 by robert burton the british scholar and writer although it wasn't until 1871 that carl otto westphal coined the term to describe several of his patients who experienced severe anxiety when walking through streets or squares there have been many attempts to explain and treat the condition critics of modernization have linked it to bad city planning psychoanalysts calling it street panic have blamed it on the oedipus complex psychiatrists have tied it to existential insecurity and describe it as the fear of places or situations that have triggered panic attacks freud believed that agoraphobia like all phobias was part of an anxiety neurosis and had a sexual origin taking as his starting point the fact that freud himself was agoraphobic and analyzing the way people have negotiated open spaces from greek and roman times to the present day paul carter finds that space fear ultimately results from the inhibition of movement along the way the author asks why freud repressed his agoraphobia and examines literature the work of architects and theorists including le corbusier walter benjamin and r d laing artists such as munch lapique and giacometti and the german street films of the 1920s he concludes by proposing a new way of regarding open space a new poetics of agoraphobia one that is sensitive to the agoraphobe's point of view and provides lessons for architects and urban planners today

change is inevitable we are told a job is lost a couple falls in love children leave home an addict joins narcotics anonymous two nations go to war a family member's health deteriorates a baby is born a universal health care bill is voted into law life comprises events over which we have considerable partial or little or no control the distance between the event and our daily lives suggests a quirky spatial politics our lives move forward depending upon how

events play out in concert with our reactions to them drawing on nearly three decades of geographic projects that involve ethnographies and interviews with and stories about young people in north and south american europe and asia and using the innovative technique of ethnopoetry aitken examines key life changing events to look at the interconnections between space politics change and emotions analysing the intricate spatial complexities of these events he explores the emotions that undergird the ways change takes place and the perplexing spatial politics that almost always accompany transformations aitken positions young people as effective agents of change without romanticizing their political involvement as fantasy and unrealistic dreaming going further he suggests that it is the emotional palpability of youth engagement and activism that makes it so potent and productive pulling on the spatial theories of de certeau deleuze massey agamben rancière zizek and grosz amongst others aitken argues that spaces are transformative to the degree that they open the political and he highlights the complexly interwoven political economic social and cultural practices that simultaneously embed and embolden people in places if we think of spaces as events and events encourage change then spaces and people become other through complex relations taking poetry to be an emotive construction of language aitken re visualizes contorts and arranges people s words and gestures to

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can architecture directly engage with the inner experience of people does it have universal or spiritual content poetics in architecture attempts to address these questions by looking at the essence of meaning of architecture and considering the human response to buildings schaik s concern is that by focusing on technical refinements and new procedural models architects are in danger of alienating the collective human connections we make with buildings this

huang xiang 黄翔 the protagonist of this book was born on 26th december 1941 in guidong county hunan province of central china after the communists came to power in 1949 he was imprisoned six times and severely persecuted for his free spirited writing and his campaigns for human rights for more than thirty years this self educated poet and writer wrote secretly against the bondage of totalitarian ideology to safe guard the freedom of speech according to the author of the book huang is a great dark poet who has expressed the painful memories fears and struggles that haunted his life creating wonderful poetic beauty in the darkness his poetic creation is a miracle in the history of chinese contemporary literature we may say that huang s identity as an unknown dark poet is conditioned by his personal emotional and tragic experiences of struggles while facing historical events such as the cultural revolution from 1966 to 1976 the april 5th movement in 1976 the democracy wall movement in 1978 and the pro democracy movement in 1989 in china

through a combination of case studies and theoretical investigations the essays in this book address the imaginative power of the threshold as a productive space in literature and art provided by publisher
