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explores the emphasis that contemporary novels films and television series place on the present arguing that hope emerges from the potentiality of the here and now rather than the future and as

intimately entangled with negotiations of structures of belonging taking its cue from an understanding of hope as connoting an organizing temporality one which is often presumed to be projecting into a future hope and kinship in contemporary fiction challenges this understanding arguing that hope emerges in practices of relationality in the present disentangling hope from a necessary correlation with futurity through close readings of contemporary works including *The Road*, *The Walking Dead*, *Cloud Atlas*, *Sense8*, *The People in the Trees* and *A Little Life*. Gero Bauer investigates how these texts explore structures of kinship as creative and affective practices of belonging and care that claim spaces beyond the heterosexual reproductive nuclear family in this context fictional figurations of the child often considered the bearer of the future are of particular interest through these interventions into definitions of and reflections on fictional manifestations of hope and kinship. Bauer's analyses intersect with queer theory, new materialism and postcritical approaches to literature and cultural studies moving towards counterintuitively hopeful readings of the present moment.

This volume provides more sustained critical attention on the use of myth and fairy tales in contemporary fiction both stand alone tales and those which are embedded in the wider frame of a novel or novella. In this light the book examines contemporary retellings of myths and fairy tales in a productive dialogue with tradition as an extended appreciation of this productive creative and theoretical dialogue. The individual chapters evince a robust variety of conceptions and approaches all thoroughly observant of the nature and workings of the relationship between story and genre and theoretically informed by innovative critical approaches. Hence the volume demonstrates the undeniable importance of myth and fairy tales in contemporary fiction suggesting questions for future consideration and hopefully pointing towards new texts and new critical inquiries.

The essays in this collection address the current preoccupation with neurological conditions and disorders in contemporary literature by British and American writers. The book places these fictional treatments within a broader cultural and historical context exploring such topics as the two cultures debate, the neurological turn, postmodernism and the post postmodern and responses to September 11th. The current literary preoccupation with neurological conditions presents us with a new and distinctive form of trauma literature, one concerned less with psychoanalysis than with the physical and evolutionary status of human beings.

From climate catastrophe to pandemics and economic crises, the problems facing humanity are dizzyingly complex and increasingly planetary in scale. Critical modesty in contemporary fiction

argues for contemporary fiction's capacity to help those who may feel despair at the enormity of such problems not as one might think through the ambitious search for grand solutions but rather by inculcating a temperament of modesty this new temperament of critical modesty locates the fight for freedom and human dignity within the limited and compromised conditions in which we find ourselves through readings of Ian McEwan, Zadie Smith, J. M. Coetzee and David Mitchell this volume shows how contemporary works of literature model modesty as a critical temperament exploring modest forms of entangled human agency that represent an alternative to the novel of the large scale that have been most closely associated with the anthropocene it makes the surprising yet compelling case that precisely by adopting a modest stance the novel actually has the potential to play a more important socio-cultural role in doing so the book offers an engaging response to the debate over critical and surface readings bringing novels into the conversation and arguing for a fictional mode that is both critical and modest reminding us how much we are already engaged with the world implicated and compromised before we start developing theories writing stories or acting within it

In this book Irma Traud Huber considers a wide range of contemporary novels to explore the variety of possibilities and effects of the use of the present tense as well as investigating the reasons for its popularity by illustrating the complexity and sophistication of four different types of contemporary usage Huber's discussion goes some way towards refuting those critical voices which consider present tense narration a passing fad and stylistic affectation as a tense of narration the present can serve to tell different stories than the past tense or can tell them differently by no means a passing fad it is an important characteristic of contemporary literature

Psychoanalytic perspectives on women and power in contemporary fiction psychoanalytically examines contemporary fiction portraying the female in a reversal of the stereotyped victim role the recent popularity of powerful female characters suggests that literature is ahead in its understanding the desires fantasies and unconscious emotions of the public this book explores a form of intimacy frequently observed in consulting rooms and in life in general malicious intimacy specific to the conjugal bond it is a type of intimacy connected to the relationship between the two halves of the couple that is extremely powerful and painful instead of clinical cases Rossella Valdré examines four contemporary and widely successful novels published contemporaneously which capture perfectly this type of psychopathological universe Valdré then maps out psychoanalytic hypotheses regarding the persistency of these malicious intimacies through analysis of these examples Valdré investigates the roots and hypotheses of a new scenario on victim executioner roles played out in the intimacy of the couple exploring how and if the contemporary couple is undergoing profound changes she provides an overview of the various deep-seated psychological mechanisms and unconscious dynamics that may be at work the book explores the need to not be dependant upon a love object as an extreme defence against abandonment or self-collapse Valdré argues that such a configuration is very common and that idealization in contemporary life is one of the reasons behind the most of sufferance in modern couples something which psychoanalysis can examine through art women perhaps after emancipation are living overturned roles and paying a higher cost as a result psychoanalytic perspectives on women and power in contemporary fiction will appeal to psychoanalysts and psychoanalytic psychotherapists and be of interest to scholars and students of literature gender
